RECTOR'S RAMBLINGS

I wonder if you have a favourite Christmas advert this year? What about Buddy the Elf at Asda? Or the slightly 'risqué' one from Aldi with Kevin the carrot? What about the John Lewis one with dad skateboarding and the arrival of a foster child? The one that really tugs my heartstrings is the little Robin 'coming home' for Christmas in the Waitrose ad.

Christmas adverts tend to fall into two main categories. There are the ones which give a faintly veiled message that if you shop with them, you will be able to create the perfect family Christmas. Some are humorous, some are heart-warming, some have no subtlety at all – but however they are done, they are saying the same thing. You get a string of images of couples and families eating food, opening gifts and keeping other Christmas traditions with things you can buy from the shop in question.

Then there are the other Christmas adverts that tell a story instead, and these are the ones I love. The adverts I mentioned above are possibly the best of that bunch for 2022. These adverts are still trying to sell you stuff, but not by showing you all the products they have to create a perfect Christmas – rather they are showing you that they "get" what Christmas is about. They understand Christmas and you can go to them to help you capture that Christmas essence for yourself.

At this point, if I were a different sort of vicar, I would get all curmudgeonly about the distinct lack of the nativity in these stories! But there is a good Christian message at the heart of these adverts: that Christmas is all about love.

In our Christmas story, we see many of these things. A God who came on a quest to the world, offering love and connection. A God who built a friendship between God and humanity, and gave himself so we might be saved. A God who by God's love and goodness transforms us so that we might be people who share God's love in the world. And it all started at Christmas with a baby...

Love, connection, reconciliation, self-giving, transformation – these Christmas adverts do "get" what Christmas is all about. Their only mistake is knowing where to go to find it. Because I promise you, that much as I love Marks and Spencer's, these are not things we can pop in a shopping basket.

Love is a gift of God. You don't have to buy it – you are only asked to share it. So this Christmas, why not take a little time to receive the love of God. And then pass that on to others. Because that is what Christmas is really about! Do join us as we celebrate this on December 11^{th} at the Carol Service at 4pm in St Peter and St Thomas' Church. Come home to the whole reason for the season and share the love of Christ with us this Christmas.



On another note, unfortunately we are all thinking about finances at this time of year. I wanted to make you all aware of the work that has been going on at St Peter and St Thomas. I am sure you will have seen the scaffolding. What started out as a relatively minor repair has uncovered significant damage and costs of around £100,000. CHAPEL NEWS

Over the last few months we have seen little world news. Everything has been dominated by local politics and sports! But there have been some major events from volcanoes (48 currently active!, Indonesia, Russia and Solomon Islands most recently) and earthquakes (Turkey, Solomon Islands, Indonesia). There are many wars still raging and a lot of terrorism still happening in so many countries. And then we have revelations about the behaviour of people in public life which leads us to have concern about those who are not in the public eye! Over the last few months I have been reading through the Old Testament again and in those historical books we see exactly the same behaviour, but of course with less sophisticated means at their disposal. The book of Ecclesiastes tells us that "there is nothing new under the sun" and when it comes to the way we treat each other and the world then that is really true. Everything we have seen, both in the natural world and in human behaviour has, despite our best efforts, all happened before, and will happen again!

But one thing that does seem to have been under the radar for a long time and now is coming to the forefront is the willingness of people to make up their own mind what is the truth and however farfetched and counter to experiential or historical evidence, these views are expounded and treated as if they have credibility.

There is a saying about learning from our mistakes, and probably one of the biggest mistakes we can ever make is to not learn from realising that our own version of the truth is rarely the correct one. If we haven't done our research, sought out experiential and historical evidence and researched the backgrounds of those views we are hearing, then we are unlikely to reach a good

conclusion. Indeed we have seen that with some of our own countries history where particular contributions to the greatness, and also the mistakes, of our nation have been whitewashed out and forgotten.

That is why those who believe in God understand that there is only one truth and we are unlikely to know it until the day when we can be with Him, when we depart from this world. As Solomon, author of Ecclesiastes says, everything is nonsense. When we look at the bigger picture of the world we realise that we are just very small cogs in a very large machine, and, as many politicians find out really quickly, we don't have control of everything or even the simple things around us. Recently a friend went, with 900 others, on what was supposed to be an enjoyable cruise, but it appears that those responsible for the ship decided that it was OK to sail into a force 10 gale and, several injuries, breakages and bruised bodies later, the captain and its owners discovered that they are not in control!! We are thankful everyone

Every farmer knows the truth of this, and we all can come to realise our place in this world and consequently learn to love one another and care for one another, just as God does, and rejoice in our experiences of life.

I hope we can all enjoy Christmas - the truth? It is the day we celebrate the birth of Jesus - God's son! How do I know? Well, I have done my research - I have checked out the history books of the day, I have checked out what others have said, I have checked out all I can and come to the conclusion that it only makes sense if this is true. I hope this year we can all come to know this truth!


